**REPORT OF THE
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the Superintending School Committee and Town of Franklin:

I trust no one will get the impression that we are about \$250 better off in the school account than we were last year, for we have had but thirty-one weeks of school, we have much less wood than we had at this time last year, and that yet to be purchased is much higher, so that, in reality, we are on about the same footing as we were last year.

The toilet conditions at the Village schools are bad. The toilets are open for everyone, there is a public building near, sixty-five pupils to be accommodated (?) and they are situated where it is difficult to take care of them. A reasonable regard for the comfort and morals of the children warrants attached toilets for the exclusive use of the pupils and under close supervision of the teachers. It would seem to be in keeping with decency and proper regard for the welfare of the pupils not to wait for the State to take the matter in hand, which is sure to happen very soon if conditions are not corrected.

The shed in which the toilets are located at West Franklin is so old that it is a waste of money to repair. The condition is not quite as bad as at the Corner on account of the location of the building.

The tables below show not only the grades and number of children in each grade in all the schools in town, but the large table shows the distribution of pupils by ages. This table will give you a fairly correct picture of the registration in the high school for the next eight years. For instance, if you will look at the bottom of the large table you will see that we are graduating nine pupils this year. As there are thirty-seven in the high school, there should be twenty-nine left. In the ninth grade there are seven, which will form the Freshman class the coming year. When the seventh grade comes into high school in 1936, the school will be the largest for several years. I have not made any estimate of tuition pupils, for, if we have only two or three, as is the case now, they will about offset those who may drop out.

To Seldon S. Smith, a Constable of the town of Franklin, in
said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Franklin, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Franklin, on Monday, the 19th day of March, A. D. 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear and act on the reports of town officers.
- 4 To choose a board of selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
- 5 To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- 6 To vote a percentage for collecting taxes, choose a collector of taxes and make all necessary arrangements relating thereto.
- 7 To choose a town auditor.
- 8 To choose a town agent.
- 9 To choose one or more fire wardens, fix their compensation, and raise a sum of money for fire bills.
- 10 To choose one member of the school board for one year to fill unexpired term of William Jordan; to choose one member of school board for three years.
- 11 To choose, or instruct the selectmen to appoint, one or more road commissioners, fix their compensation and term of office.
- 12 To choose all other necessary town officers.

- 13 To see what sum of money shall be raised for the support of free high school.
- 14 To see what sum of money shall be raised for the support of common schools.
- 15 To see what sum of money shall be raised for the repairs of school buildings.
- 16 To raise a sum of money for salary of school board.
- 17 To raise a sum of money for the salary of the superintendent of schools.
- 18 To raise a sum of money for high school and common-school text-books and supplies.
- 19 To raise a sum of money for the support of poor.
- 20 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for the suitable observance of Memorial Day, to be expended under the direction of The Daughters of Union Veterans.
- 21 To see what sum of money the town shall raise for repairs of highways and bridges, and make all necessary arrangements relating thereto.
- 22 To see what sum of money the town shall raise for incidental expenses.
- 23 To see what sum of money the town shall appropriate to be used as prizes for the boys' and girls' agricultural club of the town, and provide for spending the same.
- 24 To see what sum of money the town shall raise for payment of interest on town debts.
- 25 To see what sum of money the town shall raise for payment on town debts.
- 26 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes, for the purpose of paying the indebtedness of the town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

- 27 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the town's negotiable notes or bonds in a sum not exceeding \$————, for the purpose of renewing, refunding or paying certain indebtedness of the town, due now or to become due during the municipal year 1934.
- 28 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid, as provided in section 20, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 29 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State-aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1934, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.
- 30 To see what sum of money, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State-aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State-aid roads built within the past five years, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

- 37 To see what action the town shall take in matter of closing the Macomber Mill road, from Giles' Corner to Eastbrook town line, as a winter road, to eliminate plowing snow.
- 38 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$240 to reimburse T. M. Blaisdell & Son for granite supplied for West Franklin bridge, in excess of the original estimates and not payable by the Federal Civil Work Administration.
- 39 To see what action the town will take in the settlement of a bill of \$40 presented by C. H. Macomber for shingles furnished to East Franklin schoolhouse previous to the present municipal year.
- 40 To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
