Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town
of Franklin:

There is an unpaid balance of two hundred and fifty-five dollars on account of High school tuition otherwise we should have shown the best balance in our school account for many years, but we have assurance that this matter will be adjusted at once. Most of our badly worn books have been replaced by new ones and in some cases by more modern texts. Work books have been supplied this year in nearly all the classes at considerable cost but they are almost indispensable to teacher and pupil and for the first time we have a real workable laboratory at the High school.

These things have been done only through the co-operation of the school board who have shown fine spirit in supplying the needs of the pupils. The attached toilets at the village have added greatly to the efficiency and sanitary conditions of the school and the results obtained here should justify the erection of similar toilets at West Franklin. With the limited means at their command the school board has made some substantial and much needed improvements. The furnace at the High school, if not replaced, will need some repairs to make it last even the short time it can possibly be used.

The teachers in the elementary schools have worked hard for the success of the pupils and I hope the citizens in general appreciate, as I do, the fine work done in the High school here. In conclusion, I wish to thank the school board for their co-operation, the citizens for their fine attitude and the pupils for their excellent work.

THE WARRANT

HANCOCK, SS.

To Seldon S. Smith, a Constable of the town of Franklin, in said
County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Franklin, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Franklin, on Monday, the 18th day of March, A. D. 1935 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To hear and act on the reports of town officers.

ARTICLE 4. To choose a board of selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.

ARTICLE 6. To vote a percentage for collecting taxes, choose a collector of taxes and make all necessary arrangements relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To choose a town auditor.

ARTICLE 8. To choose a town agent.

ARTICLE 9. To choose one or more fire wardens, fix their compensation, and raise a sum of money for fire bills.

ARTICLE 10. To choose one member of the school board for one year; to choose one for three years.

ARTICLE 11. To choose, or instruct the selectmen to appoint one or more road commissioners, fix their compensation and term of office.

ARTICLE 12. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ARTICLE 13. To see what sum of money shall be raised for the support of free high school. 2000.

ARTICLE 14. To see what sum of money shall be raised for the support of common schools. 2700.

ARTICLE 15. To see what sum of money shall be raised for the repairs of school buildings.

ARTICLE 16. To raise a sum of money for salary of school board.

ARTICLE 17. To raise a sum of money for the salary of the superintendent of schools.

ARTICLE 18. To raise a sum of money for high school and common school text-books and supplies.

ARTICLE 19. To raise a sum of money for the support of poor.

ARTICLE 20. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for the suitable observance of Memorial Day, to be expended under the direction of The Daughters of Union Veterans.

ARTICLE 21. To see what sum of money the town shall raise for repairs of highways and bridges, and make all necessary arrangements relating thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see what sum of money the town shall raise for incidental expenses.

ARTICLE 23. To see what sum of money the town shall appropriate to be used as prizes for the boys and girls' agricultural club of the town, and provide for spending the same.

ARTICLE 24. To see what sum of money the town shall raise for payment of interest on town debts.

ARTICLE 25. To see what sum of money the town shall raise for payment on town debts.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes, for the purpose of paying the indebtedness of the town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the town's negotiable notes or bonds in a sum not exceeding \$————, for the purpose of renewing, refunding or paying certain indebtedness of the town, due now or to become due during the municipal year 1935.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in section 20, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.

ARTICLE 29. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1934, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

ARTICLE 30. To see what sum of money, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State aid roads built within the past five years, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

ARTICLE 31. To see what sum of money the town shall raise for the salary of the sealer of weights and measures.

ARTICLE 32. To see what sum of money the town shall raise for the future removal of snow.

ARTICLE 33. To see what sum of money the town shall raise for mothers' aid.

ARTICLE 34. To see what sum of money the town shall raise to provide for the services of a public nurse.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to issue permits to take alewives, and set the price of same.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the town will vote to raise \$50 for the repair of road leading from the Alonzo Wilbur place to George's pond.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for graduating class F. H. S. 1935.

ARTICLE 38. To provide for the spending of the interest of cemetery trust funds now held by the Town Treasurer.

ARTICLE 39. To act on any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
