ELEMENTARY SCHOOL REPORT

It is my pleasure to submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Franklin, like a number of other schools in Union No. 96, has some very crowded conditions especially in the two lower grade rooms. The school has been fortunate to have teachers who have worked very hard to give the children the best possible education under these conditions. People in Franklin should realize, however, that two grades in a crowded classroom place some definite limitations upon the amount that can be accomplished with each child.

During the past year we have had some severe problems with the heating system. The new furnace has operated well, but the pipes and traps have not carried the steam successfully. The system is very noisy and leaks have developed almost daily. A study of the heating system has just been completed and the School Committee at the time of this writing is studying the proposal.

During the past few months, the Franklin School Committee has been involved with others in teacher negotiations. Franklin will not be affected as much as will other communities in that Franklin does not have on its staff teachers with Bachelor or Masters degrees.

Aside from the very crowded condition in Franklin, education has run smoothly within the school. Mrs. Havey has supported the professional staff and has relieved them of some duties. The teachers get along well as a group and they are interested in the welfare of the children.

We are still attempting to schedule a time when we can have the new combination storm and screen windows

installed. We feel that this will cut down on our oil bills as well as making things more comfortable for students during the spring and fall.

The School Lunch Program has been able to qualify to receive 30c per lunch for each meal served to children who qualify for free lunches. With this increase, the program does not cost the town of Franklin any additional funds and it does give needy children a well-balanced meal each day.

It has been a pleasure working with the Staff, School Committee, Selectmen, Lunch Committee, and parents in Franklin. All have been pleasant and cooperative and I wish to extend my thanks to them.

COMMENTS

Town of Franklin

March 1, 1969 to March 1, 1970

An audit has been completed of the financial records of the Town of Franklin for the fiscal year ended March 1, 1970. This audit included an examination of the records maintained by the Assessors, Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Town Clerk.

The examination included a review of cash transactions as well as an analysis of available funds and expenditures. The result of the year's operation of the departmental accounts revealed that available funds exceeded expenditures by \$4,462.82.

Assets

The cash balance of \$20,154.99 was reconciled with the bank statement furnished by the Union Trust Company, Ellsworth, Maine.

Other assets, including accounts receivable, taxes, tax liens and tax acquired property were reviewed. Unpaid accounts were reconciled with the balances shown on the records of the Selectmen.

Liabilities

Total general fund liabilities amounted to \$1,362.84 which represented accounts payable of \$875.20 and \$487.64 due Trust Funds.

Reserves and Surplus

The appropriation accounts reflect unexpended balances of \$7,826.88 which are being carried forward to the ensuing year.

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$14,052.85 as compared with \$7,455.85. An analysis of this change is shown on Exhibit E.

Trust Funds

An examination of the various funds held in trust by the Town revealed that the principal of these funds amounted to \$8,550.00 and unexpended income \$533.34. These funds were legally invested with the exception of \$487.64 in the general fund.

Scope of Audit

Count of cash was made and records checked to determine the accuracy of recording cash transactions. The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Receipts, vouchers and cancelled checks were examined for a selected period and major increases or decreases in revenue or expenditures over previous years were explored.

The fidelity bonds of the various town officials were examined and found in order.

Revenue attained from the excise taxes were checked with the receipts returned by the Collector and found to be accounted for and properly recorded.

Vouchers and payrolls were examined in part and those examined appeared to be proper charges to the accounts involved.

Various laws pertaining to the fiscal operations of

the municipality were reviewed to determine that related financial transactions were properly administered.

Included in this report are exhibits and schedules pertaining to the financial status of the Town. Audit procedures were followed to the extent deemed necessary to develop those statements.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet and supporting statements fairly present the financial position of the Town at March 1, 1970 and the result of its operations for the year then ended.

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify the inhabitants of said Town of Franklin qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Grange Hall in said Franklin on Monday the 15th day of March A. D. 1971, at 7:00 in the evening, to act on the following articles, to wit.

ARTICLE

- 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year, and fix his compensation.
- 3. To hear and act on the report of Town Officers.
- 4. To choose a Board of Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year and fix their compensation.
- 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- To choose an Excise Tax Collector for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- 7. To vote a percentage for collecting taxes.

- 8. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year, and make all necessary arrangements thereto.
- 9. To choose one or more Fire Wardens for the ensuing year and fix their compensation.
- 10. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for three years.
- 11. To choose a member of the Flanders Bay Community School District Board of Trustees for three years.
- To choose, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint, one or more Road Commissioners, to fix their compensation, and term of office.
- 13. To choose a Fire Chief for the ensuing year, and fix his compensation.
- 14. To choose a Constable for the ensuing year, and fix his compensation.
- 15. To choose, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint, all other Town Officers.
- To elect a Budget Committee of two citizens to serve with the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, and School Board.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to continue to transport High School Students.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue Alewive permits.
- 19. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for Public

Health Nursing Service, said sum to be expended by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare, Bureau of Health, for local Public Health Nursing Services in Franklin for the fiscal year, July 1, 1971 to June 30, 1972.
