**COMMENTS**

**Town of Franklin  
March 1, 1979 to February 29, 1980**

An audit has been completed of the financial records of the Town of Franklin for the fiscal year ended February 29, 1980. This audit included an examination of the records maintained by the Assessors, Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Town Clerk.

The examination included a review of cash transactions as well as an analysis of available funds and expenditures. The result of the year's operation of the departmental accounts revealed that funds exceeded expenditures by \$18,095.58:

**Assets**

The cash balance of \$26,494.44 was reconciled with the bank statements furnished by the Union Trust Company, Ellsworth, Maine.

Other assets, including accounts receivable, taxes, tax liens and tax acquired property were reviewed. Unpaid accounts were reconciled with the balances shown on the records of the Selectmen.

**Liabilities**

Total general fund liabilities amounted to \$20,602.40 which represented accounts payable of \$19,616.00 and \$986.40 due Trust Funds.

**Reserves and Surplus**

The unappropriated accounts reflect unexpended balances of \$5,917.43 which are being carried forward to the ensuing year.

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$22,013.20 as compared with \$16,248.51 at the close of the prior year. An analysis of this change is shown on Exhibit E.

### Trust Funds

An examination of the various funds held in trust by the Town revealed that the principal of these funds amounted to \$9,150.00 and unexpended income \$1,059.15. These funds were legally invested with the exception of \$986.40 in the General Fund.

### Scope of Audit

Count of cash was made and records checked to determine the accuracy of recording cash transactions. The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Receipts, vouchers and cancelled checks were examined for a selected period and major increases or decreases in revenue or expenditures over previous years were explored.

The fidelity bonds of the various Town officials were examined and found in order.

Revenue attained from the excise taxes were checked in part with the receipts retained by the Collector and found to be accounted for and properly recorded.

Vouchers and payrolls were examined in part and those examined appeared to be proper charges to the accounts involved.

Various laws pertaining to the fiscal operations of the municipality were reviewed to determine that related financial transactions were properly administered.

Included in this report are exhibits and schedules pertaining to the financial status of the Town. Audit procedures were followed to the extent deemed necessary to develop these statements.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet and supporting statements fairly present the financial position of the Town at February 29, 1980, and the result of its operations for the year then ended.

Thank you for the opportunity to meet with you and Mr. Obermann on February 4 to discuss the Franklin solid waste facility. At that time we discussed site and operational deficiencies at the dump and possible courses of action for the town and for this Department.

The site is in violation of 38 M.R.S.A. § 421 (the "300 foot disposal law") and inspections conducted on June 17, 1980 and November 4, 1980 revealed violations of Chapter 400, of the Department of Environmental Protection's Regulations concerning Solid Waste. These violations were outlined in a previous letter to you.

The Town of Franklin has shown little effort to correct any of the existing problems or to implement a suitable waste disposal plan, despite Orders from the Board of Environmental Protection and Department warnings. I feel very strongly that the 7 year interval between the issuance of the first Board Order relating to the Franklin Facility, and now, should have provided more than ample opportunity for some progress in this area.

If an acceptable consent agreement cannot be negotiated, I plan to present the undated Franklin file to the Attorney General's office. My recommendation will be that they take the necessary action to gain compliance with the Maine Solid Waste Laws and Regulations, as they have successfully done in several other municipalities recently. The consent agreement procedure provides a flexible means of settling violations without court involvement. The agreement would include a compliance schedule for the closure of the present site and for implementation of an appropriate method of waste disposal, as well as provisions for monetary penalties. If the town is interested in settling the matter through this procedure, I am willing to discuss it in more detail. I am not inclined however, to waste time drafting agreements if there is not a sincere commitment to solving the problem on the part of the town of Franklin.

I would appreciate a response to this letter on or before Wednesday, April 1, 1981, so that I may plan accordingly.

**ALTERNATIVES 1 and 1A**

**New Sanitary Landfill**

This alternative involves developing and operating a new sanitary landfill in the Town of Franklin. Two cost estimates have been prepared for this alternative as operating costs will vary considerably depending on the number of days per week the site is open.

Alternative 1 considers operating under the Reduced Operating Criteria, Class II, as defined by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), with the site open only two days per week. In this case compaction and cover material is required only once every two weeks.

Alternative 1A considers operating under Reduced Operating Criteria, Class I, with the site open five days per week. Under Class I, compaction and cover material is required daily.

The capital costs will be the same in both cases, only operating costs will vary. In both cases, open burning will be prohibited.

**ALTERNATIVE 2**

**Transfer to Regional Disposal Site**

This proposal calls for the development of a small transfer system which will allow the trash from the Town of Franklin to be hauled to a regional disposal site. The most economical means of hauling the trash to a regional site would be through the use of reinforced steel containers which are capable of holding up to three tons of trash. These containers are transferred to the disposal site by a truck having a roll-off hoist

Anderson's landfill in Steuben is the closest operating regional landfill site, so it is assumed that the trash would be taken there. It should be noted, however, that there is some question as to whether or not the DEP would allow the site to accept additional trash. Anderson's site is located 21 miles from the center of Franklin.

### ALTERNATIVE 3

#### Townwide Collection Service

Downeast Disposal which is owned by Ron Anderson provides weekly collection service for the entire town of Gouldsboro. Using a compacting collection vehicle, the trash is hauled to Anderson's privately owned landfill in Steuben. The Town of Gouldsboro is presently paying approximately \$27,000 per year for this service. This figure includes a fee of \$9,000 for handling the waste at the landfill.

While Gouldsboro has a larger population than Franklin, 1,571 v. 975, and generates approximately 67 percent more trash, the distance that would have to be traveled to Steuben is greater from Franklin than Gouldsboro, so it is not anticipated that the cost of collection and transfer would be significantly reduced. The tipping fee for handling the waste at the landfill should decrease however, as Franklin generates less trash.

## **PROPOSED HAZARDOUS WASTE ORDINANCE**

### **Section I: Title**

This Ordinance shall be known as the Hazardous Waste Ordinance of the Town of Franklin, Maine.

### **Section II: Authority**

This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the home rule power granted to all municipalities under the Constitution, Article VIII-A and Title 30 MRSA, Chapter 201-A, Section 1917.

### **Section III: Purpose**

The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect the health, safety and general community well-being and to protect the natural resources of the Town.

### **Section IV: Storage and Disposal Prohibited**

The disposal or storage of hazardous wastes as designated under the 'U.S. Clean Water Act, Section 311, Public Law 92-500', and/or the disposal or storage of radioactive waste material as defined by '38 MRSA, Section 361-D.I.B', within the boundaries of the Town of Franklin, Maine is prohibited.

### **Section V: Exceptions**

Any request for an exception to this prohibition shall be submitted in writing to the Selectmen and brought to the whole Town of Franklin, acting as the body politic, to be voted on by all bona fide voters present in a Town Meeting.

### **Section VI: Penalty**

Any person to be found in violation of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and not less than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) for each offense. Each day in which a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

12. To see what amount of interest the Town wishes to charge if Article 11 is acted upon favorably.
13. To see what date the Town wishes to establish after which taxes shall be delinquent and subject to interest if Articles 11 and 12 are acted upon favorably.
14. To see if the Town wishes to instruct the Selectmen to revise the Town's General Assistance Rules and Regulations to include a "Workfare" provision.
15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Administration (from Excise Tax).
16. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction. (Note one unit represents \$1,333.00). No Recommendation.
17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell by bid and dispose of any tax titles held by the Town, after posting in three conspicuous places within the Town of Franklin, and to issue quit-claim (release) deeds for the same.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Fire Department. (Budget Committee recommends \$4,500.00.)
23. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for street lighting. (Budget Committee recommends \$1,200.00.)
24. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for ambulance service. (Budget Committee recommends \$1,416.00.)
25. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for hydrant rental. (Budget Committee recommends \$950.00.)
26. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Town Dump. (No Recommendation.)
27. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town roads. (Budget Committee recommends \$6,000.00.)
28. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for tarring roads. (Budget Committee recommends \$12,000.00 from Revenue Sharing.)
29. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for General Assistance. (Budget Committee recommends \$4,000.00.)
